Problem: If your business partner tells you, "We have concerns about recruiting" for a state classification, where should you begin your research?

Solution: You can identify the occupation the state classification is mapped to and learn more about the occupation.







To learn more about your occupation in California search for a "California Occupational Guide." Example: Management Analysts.











CA Staffing Pattern tab and select your occupation to see job growth by industry




Search Long-Term Projections

You can also research the statewide 10-year occupational projections by selecting and downloading ten-year projections statewide and by county in the Long-Term Projections menu item on same page.


